

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Letter from the director

2019 has been a very exciting year for the project. We were invited to give a talk at a side event at the United Nations High Level Political Forum on Sustainable Development Goals in New York. At this event, we highlighted the predicament of refugees, stateless and displaced children in Johannesburg and South Africa. We used this opportunity to call on the Government to institute a new documentation process.

We call for the introduction of a 'Dignity Passport' for all children in our country. This will ensure that they are given access to health and education services, regardless of their status. This is a core promise of our Constitution and anyone who works to prevent this is guilty of breaking the most fundamental laws established by our democracy.

We also met with deans of education, both directly and in provincial meetings. We spoke to trade union representatives, members of the departments of Higher and Basic Education and partners involved in the preservice and in-service training of teachers. Our purpose in these meetings has been to encourage the inclusion of our teaching resource developed to introduce conversations and lessons about xenophobia in South African schools.

We received the following news recently:

"Congratulations! On behalf of the Wharton-QS Reimagine Education Awards Steering Committee, I am delighted to inform you that your project, Three2Six Refugee Children's Education Project, has been shortlisted for the Presence Learning & Teaching Award. This year's awards process was the most competitive yet. Over 1500 applications were submitted – a 30% increase year-on-year – and the moderation process reflected that, with a 60% increase in independent judge evaluations. To be shortlisted is a testament to the excellence of your work." As a shortlisted project, we are entitled to showcase our project at the event.


2019 has also had its difficulties. We started the year underfunded. Thanks to the generosity of various funders and the efforts of our fundraising team, we were able to secure enough funding for the project by the end of April. We are approximately 71% funded for 2020 and have funding agreements that continue into 2021 and 2022. The fundraising team is hard at work submitting proposals for the remaining 29%. We have several prospects and currently have two proposals that have been submitted by the 501c3 team in America. On that note, if any of you have contacts in the United States that you are willing to introduce us to, we would like to follow up on additional opportunities.

We have a very capable team in New York who has raised close to a million rand this year and all they need is for someone to open the door. A personal introduction goes a long way to achieving this. Every cent is important and gives children a better chance in life.

I will conclude by wishing you all a happy holiday and a blessed Christmas. Our grade 3s developed the **Kitoko Radio project**, supported by two Brazilian volunteer journalists, Joao Heim and Honi Rubik. The goals of the project were to promote child participation in the learning process, critical thinking, listening and interaction in a group.

The project taught the children about citizenship and what it means to be a refugee. The children learnt more about culture, identity and belonging, empowering them to voice their opinion about being a refugee. The children also learnt about values, discipline, democracy and gender equality.

The class teacher noted that, "In general most learners improved academically. Their listening and

speaking skills have improved."

Computer literacy training



Our Holy Family College campus held computer training lessons for seven weeks every Friday from the 28th of September till the 15th of November. Our volunteer, Honi Rubik, and our IT intern, Palesa Morele, facilitated the training. Our overall goal for the training was to improve our teachers' computer skills and provide them with working knowledge of computer programs such as Microsoft Office (Word, Excel and PowerPoint) and how to

administer our ADAM software to assist with capturing learner marks and basic internet functions.

We decided to implement the training to help our teachers address some of their challenges around creating lesson plans and other documents to use for their class work. The majority of our teachers have no practical computer background – the training was critical for our staff. We had four teachers involved in the training who were enthusiastic about learning and discovering new things and computer programs they could utilize not only to benefit themselves but also the Project.

Sacred Heart College day





The Sacred Heart College Marist Observatory celebrated its 130th birthday on Friday the 4th of October. The college has stood on the Observatory premises for 95 years. Our Three2Six children were invited to take part in the celebrations.

The Sacred Heart day included a variety of activities, such as Holy Mass for the entire college, pre-primary school performances, traditional sharing of sticky buns and coke, and a sports day.

The theme for this year's festivities was "Celebrating Yesterday, Today and Tomorrow". Sacred Heart College alumni were invited to attend and share their school memories.

We learnt about the history of the college and bade farewell to the class of 2019 as they take on new challenges for their future.

Our children attended the Holy Mass. We also joined the rest of the College in sharing classes and playing games.

This was а opportunity for the project to exchange ideas on challenges and best practices

with receiving and sending organisations and to learn more about the experiences of volunteers in the field.

The event also included a field visit to one of the organisations represented in the conference and implementing activities in the surrounding areas: Stepping Stones International and Hope Worldwide. Participants introduced their organisations and the work they do. Throughout the event, our teaching resource "Talking and Thinking about Refugees" was widely distributed to organisations working in South Africa, Malawi and Botswana, to always ensure a mind-set shift on a larger scale.

Primary Schools athletics meeting

Right to play workshop

On the 29th of November, our international volunteer Honi Rubik facilitated a workshop with some of the Three2Six teachers to discuss children's rights, including their right to play. Seven teachers from Holy Family College and the teachers from Observatory Girls' Primary Schools participated.

This was an opportunity to share a Marist experience and a production from Brazil. Honi is a journalist and works for the Marist Centre of Children's Rights Defence. Honi came to South Africa to work with the children and teach them about the global Marist Mission to protect refugee children.

The learning concepts were based on the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child, focusing on the right to play. The teachers played some games to remind them of childhood and watched a video from the series Brincadiquê, which was produced to support teachers to discuss and strengthen their knowledge about how to play.

Parents English class certificates



On Saturday, the 30th of November, 11 of our parents completed their 36 hours of English class sessions. The program is run by the Turquoise Harmony Institute and it aims to assist parents with basic English conversational skills to enhance their communication ability in their daily attempts to settle into the South African society. The program will carry on next year with a new group of parents.

Play day



On the 27th of November, a team from **A Chance to play Southern Africa** hosted a workshop with both parents and learners from the Observatory Girls' Primary School campus. The purpose of the workshop was to teach parents how to play with their children at home. The facilitators talked about different types of play and why play is important to children. Parents were also told to actively participate in their children's education and to learn from them. The

children participated in group work activities and could choose what they wanted to do. The different activities included painting, drama and different games. Our learners were excited to participate and to learn with their parents.

Weekly reading activities



At our Holy Family College campus, our Three2Six participated in weekly reading activities with the international volunteers. Each child chooses a book to take home to read with their families. After each week, they can then practice reading with a volunteer, and talk about the story they read. Their families are also involved. The campus coordinator volunteers encourage families to support and learn with their children. The teachers have noticed vast improvements in their learner's reading skills. Our grade 2B teacher says the learners are now able to read fluently.

Our Grade 3 teacher notes that the children can also communicate better, with improved vocabulary.

December holiday program





On the 2nd of December, our annual December Holiday Program kicked off. Despite the rainy weather, our children and volunteers had a wonderful time. This year's focus was on play, resilience and reading. The programme management team organised many playful activities.

The new additions to this year's edition were isiZulu classes, a performance by Hooked on Books, judo lessons for all our grades, a body positive talk and a visit to Sci Bono and one to Play Africa - an NGO that promotes the children's right to play. We also reintroduced our cooking lessons and we continued with our swimming lessons, science lessons (on the environment), our craft activities, drama games and visited the zoo again this year.

We finished off with a lovely disco party that got everyone moving! We were very lucky to welcome our Australian volunteers from the Australian Catholic University again and our team from Marcellin College. Thank you so much for bringing your energy and your skills to the holiday programme! We also want to thank our teachers, our project's volunteers and local volunteers from the surrounding schools

for dedicating their time to our children as well as our team for being part of this great adventure.

Fundraising update

Looking ahead

Because of the shortage of funding at the beginning of 2019, no new classes were started, and we reduced our numbers from 325 to 225. If funding is discontinued at any point, our priority is to serve the children already in the program, with a reduction in numbers by 75 children per year. This means that the entire program can be closed in 3 years without negatively impacting children already in the program. In our future project planning, our Board is looking at this very carefully to ensure enough funding requests are made and new funding explored to avoid this occurring. Ideally, the project should at least be able to maintain a level of 225 children per year. This is dependent on the state of the economy and inflation.

The project has made a strategic decision not to open new classes and enrolments but to maintain the number of students in the project until funding is confirmed. The project will retain 225 learners at the beginning of 2020.

A program like ours will always be vulnerable to our capacity to do fundraising and the willingness of foundations, corporations and individuals to provide us with funding.
