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Three2Six's director talks at a side-event of the United Nations

The Three2Six project was invited by its long-standing funder Misean Cara to take part as a panellist in a side-event of the UN High Level Political Forum (HLPF) on sustainable development this month.

The 2019 focus of the HLPF is on "empowering people and ensuring inclusiveness and equality". To tie into this, the side-event looked at "Addressing inclusion, inequality and institutions".

The event took place on the 10th of July at the Church Centre for the United Nations and was hosted by the Salesians of Don Bosco.

The panellists included representatives from Anglophone West Africa Province of Salesians, from inter-congregation sustainable the agriculture program and from our project. Participants to the included event also representatives from Franciscans International, Misean Cara Ireland and Don Bosco Network.



The panellists were all from countries presenting their Voluntary National Reviews (VNRs) at the main HLPF event which focused on sustainable development goals number 4 (education), 8, 10, 13, 16 and 17 this year. They shared their experiences grassroots of working towards achieving those goals and discussed how they are in fact interlinked.

During the event, the project announced the international launch of its Talking and



Thinking about Refugees resource (available here: <u>http://www.three2six.co.za/ttr-2/</u>) and shared its efforts to support the South African government in achieving Goal 4 (Ensure inclusive and equitable quality education and promote lifelong learning opportunities for all) for refugee, asylum seeker and migrant children in South Africa while looking at the current situation in terms of access to mainstream schooling for those same children.

The event was well-attended and a Q&A session gave the audience the opportunity to engage with our director and the other participants. Through this event, the project reached civil society organisations (CSOs), state representatives from African countries as well as members of religious congregations.

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Attendance to conferences

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The panel shared their key recommendations to tackle the global learning crisis and to increase access to early childhood education in all contexts (both development and emergency contexts). Data on global progress towards this goal was also presented and explained, which revealed the efforts that are still to be made in this field. The team also had the pleasure to visit Democracy Prep Harlem High School. Democracy Prep has been actively engaged with our project over the last few years by sending some of their students over to our campuses to run fun activities with our children, as we recently shared with you in our 2019 newsletters.



James Lee, a Korean program coordinator in the organisation, showed us the campus and

introduced us to the model of Democracy Prep which slogan is "Work hard. Go to College. Change the world!"

We also had the opportunity to join two classes of their summer academy program which supports with extra classes learners who struggled, to help them pass.



The school model has a focus on civic engagement and the goal it set out is to prepare learners to become active citizens and leaders in the United States.

The mother of a past learner visits us to say thank you



On Friday the 26th of July, Skhanyiso Mpofu, a former learner of the project came to visit Three2Six on its Sacred Heart College campus, together with her mother Thembelihle Tshuma. The visit was intended to show gratitude and thankfulness to the project for the assistance received when Skhanyiso was still a learner in the project, between 2016 and 2018: "I never thought that I could ever find great teachers and great friends. All I thought was that I was going to be alone and alone forever" says Skhanyiso who is now 11 years old.

Having Skhanyiso at the project had a positive impact on her mother's life too. Thembelihle said that she pushed harder to secure a place for her daughter in the project because Skhanyiso used to always ask her if she will ever get an opportunity to go to school as her friends from her neighbourhood were attending school. But it was not easy for a mother living under difficult conditions in Johannesburg. After arriving in South Africa from Zimbabwe, Thembelihle had to look for employment: "It was not only for my child but for me too. I managed to change my life and if there was no support from Three2Six, I was not going to make it because I was going to be stuck at home, worrying about the school fees and the documents but at least Three2Six project took half of my luggage" Thembelihle added.

After spending three years at Three2Six, Skhanyiso who is now in Grade 6 at a mainstream school gives advice to children who are in the same situation that she was in before joining the project: "All I can say is to use all the opportunities and learn how to be kind and be sweet to other people and never give up".

Most of our learners face a lot of difficulties and it is always a great pleasure to see them overcome those challenges and perform well.

Finally, Thembelihle wanted to thank the people who supported her, her daughter and the children of the project: "To all those people, I don't even know where should I start to thank them. The job that they are doing it's so overwhelming and we are very grateful for the chance which they are giving these kids "

Three2Six alumni receives his South African residence permit

From Angola, Sedler Miguel joined the Three2Six Project in 2012 when he was 12 years old. With the help of his godfather and his good marks at Three2Six, he went to a regular school and is now enrolled in Grade 12. Recently, he received his South African permanent residence permit. Following is more on him and his story, with a testimony about the time he spent at Three2Six:

"My name is Sedler Miguel. I am 13 years old. I am from Angola. I stay with my cousin in Johannesburg in South Africa since the time I was born. I never went to school until last year (2013) when Andrew Bannister, the godfather of my cousin, registered me into the Three2Six Project. I was then 12 years old and I was placed in Grade 5.

Before I came to the Project, my cousin had tried hard to find a school for me but in every school that he approached they had all said no. I used to wake up in the morning and watch the other children going to school, how they laugh with their friends and look so smart in their uniforms and I would wonder when will be my turn to even sit in the class, raise up my hand and discuss with the other learners on class matters, then I would feel like I am losing hope for my future. When I met Andrew [Sedler's mentor], he asked me many questions and the one that troubled me was, 'which school do you go to?' I told him my story then he looked so sad.

He said, 'I will make a plan'. Two weeks later, he made a call and told my cousin that he had found a school for me. I was so happy and excited and when he took me at school in my Three2Six uniform, I felt so smart and happy and I knew that, with the help of God, my future will be bright."

From the time that Sedler was given a chance to start his schooling, he worked hard so that after his first year in Grade 5, he would know how to read and write properly. His immense efforts helped him to achieve his Grade 5 academic goals. He completed Grade 6 among our top learners and earned himself a scholarship for his high school. Andrew has played a huge role in mentoring him, and we are very grateful to him for all the support and help through these years. He went as far as assisting Sedler to get his permanent residence here in South Africa.

Sedler is currently in Grade 12, and we wish him the best with his matric exams, and indeed, to fulfil his dream of having a bright future at University and a successful life. We are very proud of all that Sedler has accomplished since he has left the project.



We are halfway towards the end of the year and we have many exciting activities planned for the year. We would like to thank all of our partners and donors who visited the project in the last quarter to have an experience of our project and spend a day with the children. We value the opportunity to share the work that we do and all your valid contributions to the project.
